Each month, a GWRRA "Area Run List" report is sent to the Chapter CDs and MECs so that new GWRRA members (those who joined in the previous month) can be contacted. This data comes from the GWRRA master database in Phoenix. In July, there were three new members listed in the zip-code area serviced by Chapter FL1-W, so I tried to contact them. I did get in touch with two of them and sent them information about our Chapter. The third name was Gary Hoop (of Tavares), whom I could not contact – so I hope he does not mind if I mention his name here. I talked to his wife, and she told me that Gary was on a motorcycle trip to Alaska with twelve other motorcycles. She told me to check a web-site if I actually wanted to know where he was.

According to the web-site, AlaskaBikeRun.com, the annual Alaska Bike Run is the World's Longest Group Motorcycle Benefit Run. The site posts: "Why not make a tax deductible donation to help deaf, deaf/blind or medically fragile babies? 100% of donations go to SKI-HI, an early intervention group." The run starts in St. Augustine, Florida and runs to Alaska and back each year. The group starts small, but adds bikes (that have preregistered) as the group proceeds on the journey. This year bikes were joining from Alabama, Mississippi, Georgia, Tennessee, South Dakota and California. The 2010 run started on July 16 and should complete in St. Augustine on August 5.

The ride - and the web-site - are pretty well organized. The schedule and all the stops are planned ahead of time so all the riders know what kind of schedule they will be expected to keep (350-450 miles per day on back roads). To see info from the 2010 trip, go to AlaskaBikeRun.com and click on "DAILY UPDATES BEGINNING JULY 17, CLICK HERE". If you click on "2010 Schedule" on the left sidebar, you can see the schedule, a list of registered bikers, and a short bio on each of the bikers. I found it interesting reading material. It kind'a makes me want to drive to Alaska.



From Bicycles to Motorcycles

It all started a long time ago, when I lived in Olean, New York. I rode some Whizzer motorbikes, a Cushman Scooter and a Czech 125 two stroke. All this was in the late 1940's, 1950 and 1951.



Some fun back in those days. I was not "allowed" to have a motorized two wheel vehicle of my own. My parents were afraid I would get hurt or something like that. Bicycles I did have, several of them. My first bicycle was a 24 inch model. At first I could ride the bike as I didn't know how. After I learned how to ride the bike, I would ride around with my

friends. Doggone nearly got kilt on that one. Riding with some friends on a sidewalk, they all went out a driveway into the street and I followed. The result of hitting a car was that the handlebars were straight but the front wheel was 90 degrees off to the right. We straightened the wheel and continued our ride.....

Later I saved my money and bought a brand new Roadmaster 26 inch bike. It was real nice. It had a headlight and a tail light with a built in brake light that gave up the ghost after a couple months. The slip ring contact for the brake light on the rear hub wasn't very strong. I later had another 26 inch bike that was as

light as possible and still had fenders and chain guard. I would leave high school after my last class for the day, ride my bike over the walk bridge in back of the high school to the steps where I carried the bike down three flights to the street. Then I would ride over to where I met the Buffalo Evening News truck. My job on the truck was to assist the driver in



delivering the bundle of newspapers to the newsstands and for the boys who delivered their routes. When I got to the truck, I had to lift the bike up to put it in the back of this 2 ton truck that came to Olean every day.

I later bought a Raleigh bike with a Sturmey-Archer three speed hub. This bike I took to Syracuse after graduating high school in 1951.

In December 1958, I decided that I had enough of the ice, snow, freezing rain, etc. in New York State and I moved to Florida. I didn't have a job when I got here and now my parents with whom




I was living, said I could now have a motor scooter for transportation. I had to sell the station wagon I used to move to Florida, paid off the loan on the car and had enough money to buy a new 1959 Vespa 125 scooter. After about 10 months I had enough money to buy a car and then sold the

scooter.

Several years later, Marilyn and I bought a Lambretta 125 scooter. We thought that would be fun. HA! It wouldn't get out of its own way. Spit and sputter and carry on and would not get over 25 mph. Took it back to where I got it (I didn't know a motor scooter mechanic then and neither did the guy I bought the scooter from). We got our money back from the scooter and that ended the two wheel motor powered vehicles for a while.

In the early 1970's I bought a Sears 50cc motorcycle made by PUCH. It was fun but would not carry both of us. The next bike was a Honda CM70. That was Marilyn's bike.



A little while later I bought a Honda CB360 and gave the CB175 to our oldest son. Next Marilyn bought a Honda CB400 from a neighbor. We would go for rides around Central Florida on the 360 and 400 bikes.



In 1982 I bought a new Yamaha Maxim 750. Boy, I was

really getting up there in the bigger, faster bikes. Marilyn felt left out and we found a Yamaha Maxim 650 at RC Hills bike shop on West 50. We traded the 400 for that. We noticed when the tag for the 650 came up for renewal that the registration was still saying the Honda 400. We went back to RC Hills and found that they never had the title to the 650. They had bought the bike from an Orlando Policeman who thought the bike was going to be scrapped. Seems he had laid it down and scratched up a few things, like the clutch lever, turn lights, a little bit on the engine cases. The bike wasn't really in such bad shape, oh yes, son, Phil was working at RC's at the

time and he had checked it out and did some repairs on it. Now regarding the title to the 650, the Orlando Policeman was contacted by RC Hill and come to find out, the title was still at his Credit Union. As I said before, he thought the bike was going to be scrapped, parted out or whatever,



and had never turned the title over to RC Hill. We finally got the title problem straightened out.

Long about November 1983, Marilyn and I decided to take a road trip with the Retreads. We went to "Mule Days" in Calvary, Georgia, a little town north of Tallahassee. We spent the day there and that afternoon we went to Thomasville, Georgia to a Days Inn where we had reservations. We must have had 20 people in our group. Somebody looked in the phone book and found a restaurant in downtown Thomasville. They called, made reservations and downtown we went. This was a Saturday afternoon and the townspeople must have rolled up the sidewalks at 3:30 that day. We found parking at the curb in front of the restaurant and went in. A couple wise guys in the group made a comment to the wait staff that if we didn't get good service, we were known to tear up the place. They put us in a side room off the back dining room. We were having a great time, ordered our food and were enjoying our meal when we discovered that a lot of the locals were being seated in the dining room and were staring at us. You know how bikers get when we get to telling stories get a little loud, well, we were getting loud. As we were getting ready to leave, the restaurant got so quiet you could hear a pin drop. 

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Parking the Wing





As the saying goes-"The ride's not over until the wing is parked." Is there just one rule to parking a motorcycle? No. There are no absolute rules when it comes to parking vour ride in a safe manner.





There are however, a few tips:


• Its summer time and asphalt can become nearly the consistency of quick sand. Be sure to use a foot under the side stand. Even new or poor quality asphalt may not hold up against the side-stand weight of a wing. Attach a string onto the foot to facilitate picking it up after you've climbed aboard.





















Remember, you should carry contact emergency information, along with medications and allergies, readily accessible. Is your First Aid kit in your trunk? If it's in a saddle bag, you might not be able to get to it. Also, always carry your cell phone on your person, in a jacket pocket or on your belt in the event you get separated from your bike in an emergency situation, you can still call for help.

Final Thoughts on the Great Northwest Motorcycle Trip

We rode 9,330 miles on this trip. We started by going to Wing Ding in Des Moines, Iowa. We stayed a week at Wing Ding with Kevin and Claire Lang. We had a great time. This was our first Wing Ding.

We visited 30 states and provinces along the way. Some states we rode through more than once, Idaho for instance, we went through the bottom on Idaho when visiting with Mike and then the top of Idaho when we were heading up to British Columbia, and we rode through Georgia and Florida just to get out of, and then into, our home state. They were in order of our trip: FL, GA, AL, TN, KY, IN, IL, MO, IA, NB, SD, WY, MT, ID, OR, WA, BC, AL, SK, MB, ND, MN, WI, MI, OH, PA, WV, VA, NC, SC. We were gone 40 days, from June 23 to August 1, 2010. Ted and I have also ridden our bikes in all of the lower 48 states! We have also ridden our bikes in 6 Canadian provinces.

We have tried different clothes, bags, cooling and heating systems, and packing configurations as we have traveled. Each time we are slimming down the list and becoming more efficient at what we do carry. This The Great Northwest MC Trip has been the most efficient in those terms. Our first, The Great Southwest MC Trip, we had everything but the kitchen sink strapped somewhere on us. Last year's trip, The Great Northeast MC Trip, we went with friends and had a great time, but we still had too much stuff. This year we had to take some stuff to Wing Ding, but then we shipped it home along with some purchases. We did the same thing again once we were at our son's and daughter-in-law's home. Our motto now is, less is better!

We were plagued with failures of one sort or another. The big one was Ted's front tire going flat while on I-29 out of Sioux City, SD. Valve stem let loose. He did a great job of pulling off the side of the road safely. I had the left front fork seal let go, spraying me with fork oil, while going down the road in Cochranton, PA. Ted's GPS Zumo 550 stopped working. We think it is a loose wire. My CB talk switch works intermittently, along with a cord connector problem. Ted's CB will only work off of the passenger cord. The Tire Pressure Monitor System on both bikes stopped working completely. Yikes!

Ted and I have gotten better at documenting our trips. We got a GE A735 camera at KMart on our first trip when we were at my brother's place in Mississippi on that first southwest trip. I used it and it took a beating. I used it on the northeast trip too, and again it took a beating. I used it on this northwest trip and it again took a beating. It is the best camera! This year I got a new laptop that I can take with me instead of trying to rely on hotel computers - thank goodness! The laptop is a MacBook Pro and fits right into my saddle bag. And I learned how to

upload pictures to my blog from the camera to the laptop. It is so much nicer and I'm pleased with the results. These two pieces are definitely worth the space they take

Overall, we had one great trip! The best was seeing our kids, Eric and Summer, and grandkids, Bridger and

Noah. That's Bridger on my computer. Noah is just a little over two months old so this was the first we had a chance to see him. Also, we were able to visit with so many people we hold dear, both family and friends. It was great to see everyone, but not long enough. attended our first Wing Ding. That was pretty exciting, and



to do it with great friends, Kevin and Claire, was the best. We saw a lot of fabulous country and met some fellow travelers along the way. They always seem to spice up a trip as we all share road stories. The weather was tremendous on the most part. We rode mostly in the 70's. We layered up for mornings and were usually in before it got cold at night. As far as altitude is concerned, we got up to almost 11,000 feet to see snow along the road at Beartooth Pass in Montana. There were other opportunities as well to see snow along the road and feel the cold, but Beartooth as the tallest. Rivers were also notable. We crossed the Mississippi a number of times, and one time it looked like a creek. I just know we were close to the headwaters. We also crossed the Yellowstone, the Gallatin (where I learned to fly fish), the Snake, the Missouri, and the Ohio. Some great bridges were crossed by our wings, but the crown is the Mackinac Bridge going from Lake Superior to Lake Michigan. We had such a fabulous motorcycle vacation! Now I'm just left with the memories and

No More Boring Pictures - By Jim Gorski

Hey it's raining, what's new in July in Florida

Perfect time to take 20 minutes, read your camera's instruction manual digital describing how the **self timer** works, don't just read it PRACTICE IT until you can do it quickly without having to refer to the manual. This feature allows you and your rider to be part of many pictures while you travel without try to enlist someone else to take their time to take YOUR pictures. Trust me, get comfortable in this simple step and you will reduce your stress level and frustrations on your journeys, not to mention Chapter gatherings, and family functions. Once you've mastered the Self Timer operation, consider purchasing one of those mini tripods to stabilize your camera or use some Velcro on the bottom of your camera and on the top of your Butler big Gulp Mug. Place it on the highway, a bench, maybe even a fence post; but be sure to consider the wind velocity and stability when selecting this prop.

Let's move to the Right, or the Left?

The title says it all! Let's get off center, not out of balance just a different perspective. It's not a secret that serious amateur photographers and professionals alike have adopted a photo technique dividing the viewfinder into thirds, whether vertical or horizontal, many boring pictures can be made more interesting by taking that bike and rider and moving it to the left or right of center and allow the viewer to see the background. The bike and rider take up one third and the scenic background takes up remaining two thirds giving the viewer an interesting picture with depth versus just a happy face in the center of a picture while the viewer

struggles to look around the center of attention, and see what actually is in the background.

Use Signage for Titling and Defining

As we travel the summer months, it is easy to show we



entered Arizona (or you pick the state), by filling almost the entire frame with a picture of the AZ Hwy Dept's Generic Welcome sign -----BORING, better to put the bike and rider, in the left one third, the mountains in the background in the middle third and the Welcome sign in the right third Or whatever order might allow you to have the front tire pointing to the signage. Capture signage describing National Parks or monuments to help tell your story upon your return. With Digital cameras, you cannot take too many "titling" or "story telling" pictures which will aid in composing your photo album. Some of these photo "techies" using PhotoShop or similar software have been able to creatively blend some of the pictures into, next to, or over the actual scene itself.

In summary, gather pictures of signage, trying to incorporate some background of what the sign may be describing and move it off center to include the point of interest.

Learn how to use the self timer, more importantly USE IT!

Have an extra one or two memory cards and extra batteries. Now go out there and have fun, and record some of that fun!!
